PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

A few weeks ago I heard a commentator say, "The last three quarters have brought the economic world to its knees." Two thoughts crossed my mind when I heard that statement.

First, I thought of a lot of good things that happen from our knees. In Western culture, men sometimes get into the kneeling position to propose marriage. And if they want

to conserve their energy, they just stay on their knees and move straight into asking for forgiveness. For everything. Including proposing in the first place. Another good kneeling activity is prayer. We don't kneel to pray as much as our forebears did. My older brother used to do it, and it made me feel guilty until I found out he usually fell asleep somewhere around "...thy kingdom come."

One of the best kneeling things we can do is give up. In the past year, our two oldest children were ordained to the ministry of word and sacrament in the Presbyterian Church. Both asked me to give their ordination sermons. And both expressed confidence that, if nothing else, I would keep those sermons short. For Brenna, I chose the Luke 5 story of Jesus rounding up his disciples. Peter and the others have spent all night fishing a shutout. So the carpenter gives the guys a fishing tip. And they catch so many fish that their nets tear. Peter has seen Jesus do miracles, but this is his tipping point. He drops to his knees and says, "Get away from me, Lord. I am a sinner."

When Peter falls to his knees and confesses his unworthiness, Jesus says, "Don't be afraid. From now on you will catch people." Peter's pride is shattered. He gives up. He tips over. And his tipping point becomes his "from now on" point.

Individually and collectively, we Christians need to join Peter — in a heap at the feet of Christ. If we're not careful, our pride will keep us from reaching the "from now on" point. I hope 2009-10 will keep Whitworth and all followers of Christ from trusting too much in their own adequacy.

My second thought about the commentator's "brought to its knees" remark was how blessed Whitworth was in 2008-09. This annual report chronicles an amazing year. We did not buckle to our financial knees. Through your generosity, God's grace and the strong discipline of Whitworth's people, we accomplished many of our goals, we balanced our budget, and no job became a victim of the economy. As Vice President of Finance and Administration Brian Benzel observed, "When the storm hit, Whitworth was already operating at an efficiency level that some institutions were making cuts to reach." We offer special thanks to Brian, to Associate V.P. for Finance and Administration Luz Merkel, and to Brian's predecessor, Tom Johnson, for leadership in this area. In the two or three years preceding the economic crisis, I often felt that my own leadership might have been too conservative financially. Maybe it was, but this past year was one in which our restraint served us well.

The high-fives notwithstanding, we enter a new fiscal and academic year with an urgent need for facilities that can accommodate our growth. We need to build a new science building while we rebuild our endowment. That will be a challenge. We will not get it done through our own strength. Your generosity and God's abundant grace are our best and only hopes. Thank you for your support — past, present and future.

2008-09 YEAR IN REVIEW

JULY 8, 2008

Professor of Communication Studies Jim McPherson's latest book – *The Conservative Resurgence and the Press: The Media's Role in the Rise of the Right* (Northwestern University Press, 2008) – challenges conventional wisdom and leads to McPherson being named a finalist for a top research award.

AUG. 22, 2008

U.S. News' America's Best Colleges guide places Whitworth at No. 6 in the magazine's ranking of 116 master's-level universities in the 17-state region of the West and at No. 5 in its ranking of best values in the same category.

SEPT. 15, 2008

Generations of Whitworth students will study the ecology and wildlife of the picturesque Scotia Valley, in southern Pend Oreille County, through a planned gift of 605 acres made by Betty Verbrugge and her late husband, Durand. Betty and her son, Gary, recently established an endowment fund with Whitworth, to be used for maintenance of the property and for future construction of a small field station for environmental studies and research.

OCT. 13, 2008

David Oliver Relin, co-author of *The New York Times* bestseller *Three Cups of Tea*, the common reading book for Whitworth's freshman seminar, speaks to a packed Cowles Auditorium about Montanan Greg Mortenson's work to build more than 60 schools in Afghanistan and Pakistan.



FEB. 9, 2009

Whitworth pays tribute to longtime Professor of English Leonard Oakland with the inaugural Leonard A. Oakland Film Festival Feb. 20-22. The festival, the focal point of Heritage Month 2009, features three film showings and discussions with several of the filmmakers, including Oakland's longtime friend Ron Shelton, writer/director of *Bull Durham* and *White Men Can't Jump*. To honor Oakland's 40-plus years of service, Whitworth has established an endowment to support film studies.

FEB. 17, 2009

Whitworth earns a place on the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll, which is the highest federal recognition a school can achieve for its commitment to service-learning and civic engagement.

MARCH 6-14, 2009

The theatre department presents its spring production, Tina Howe's *Museum*, which portrays an art gallery in a museum on the last day of a modern art exhibit, *The Broken Silence*.

MARCH 30, 2009

Whitworth's student newspaper, *The Whitworthian*, is named a finalist for an Associate Collegiate Press Online Pacemaker Award, considered one of the highest honors in student journalism.

OCT. 30, 2008

The 2008 Whitworth Science & Society Lecture Series features John Horack, a NASA scientist and manager of the Science and Missions Systems Office at the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center, in Huntsville, Ala., speaking on, "50 Cents, 50 Years – Finding the Value of the Space Program on the Back of a Quarter."

NOV. 19, 2008

Actor, director and producer Leonardo Defilippis presents a gripping, two-hour, one-man performance of the entire gospel of John.

NOV. 15, 2008

A team of Whitworth students takes first place at the seventh annual Northwest Regional Ethics Bowl, in Seattle, defeating groups from Central Washington University, Montana State University and the University of British Columbia. The team goes on to finish fifth at the National Intercollegiate Ethics Bowl.

JAN. 7, 2009

Award-winning television and radio commentator Callie Crossley presents a timely lecture, "For Better AND Worse: The Shotgun Marriage of New and Old Media and its Impact on Election '08."

JAN. 21, 2009

Whitworth is included for the third straight year in Kiplinger's ranking of the top 50 private university values in the U.S. Whitworth is No. 39 in the 2009 rankings, to be found online at www.kiplinger.com/ tools/privatecolleges.













APRIL 16, 2009

The 2009 Simpson-Duvall Lectureship features the Rev. Peter Storey, a champion of nonviolence who served as chaplain to Nelson Mandela, the former president of South Africa, when he was in prison. Storey speaks on the role of the church in peacemaking and reconciliation in South Africa.

APRIL 25, 2009

More than 120 Whitworth and Gonzaga undergraduate students from a number of academic disciplines present their original research during the Spokane Intercollegiate Research Conference at Whitworth University.

APRIL 25, 2009

The Whitworth Hawaiian Club shares the "Spirit of the Islands" in food and culture with the Whitworth and Spokane communities during the club's 39th annual lu'au.

MAY 8, 2009

Whitworth senior Amy Watts is selected from a list of students nationwide to receive Pi Lambda Theta's 2009 Distinguished Student Scholar Award. Watts is the first Whitworth student to win the award, which includes a \$500 scholarship and a one-year honorary membership in Pi Lambda.

MAY 17, 2009

Ron White, author of three best-selling books on Abraham Lincoln, including his latest, *A. Lincoln: A Biography,* returns to Whitworth, where he once taught, to address graduates at the 119th undergraduate commencement ceremony. THE NUMBERS

With sacrificial support from donors and strong enrollment demand, Whitworth experienced a solid year in spite of the economy. The largest change was to the endowment, which closed the fiscal year at \$73.2 million, down from a high of almost \$93 million the year before. This had the single largest effect on the university's net assets, which were down \$23 million, or 15.8 percent, from the year before. In spite of the challenges faced by so many Whitworth families, an incredible 4,473 donors supported Whitworth this year, for which we are very thankful. New gifts and pledges booked this year totaled \$6,532,795, while gifts and prior-year pledge payments received this year reached \$7,226,660.

The Whitworth Foundation continues to work on planned gifts that provide income and tax benefits to donors in the near term and benefit Whitworth in the long term. The assets of the foundation ended the year at \$18,871,790. These assets, while not part of the university's operating budget, are important for Whitworth's long-term financial strength.


An increase in freshman applications, as well as growth in continuing studies and graduate programs, reflected strong demand for a Whitworth education; 2,781 students were enrolled for the fall term. As President Bill Robinson explained in a message to alumni, parents and friends, "We find ourselves in both a strong position and a tenuous position. Our strength in this bear market comes from Whitworth's relatively modest reliance on endowment income in its operating budget, compared to what you would find in the 'big endowment' institutions. We are a tuition-driven university, and for the last decade we have seen far more applications than we can accommodate. We have been in a very strong enrollment situation. But being so dependent on enrollment is also our greatest point of vulnerability...We are keeping 'retain and recruit' at the forefront of our institutional consciousness."

Whitworth University's strong financial position in the midst of uncertainty, documented in this annual report, is possible only because of your generous and steadfast commitment to our mission to honor God, follow Christ and serve humanity. On behalf of our current students and generations of students to come, we thank you.

- Whitworth's alumni-giving percentage continued to decrease in the last fiscal year, due in part to the more than 500 students who graduate each year and add to the base total. In total, 2,818 alumni made gifts to Whitworth last year.
- In Fiscal Year 2009, 746 alumni, parents and friends made their first gifts to Whitworth, comprising 17 percent of total donor households. Consistent annual gifts from these new donors are key to Whitworth's continued success.
- Nearly half of all Whitworth donors belong to The 1890 Society, a giving club that recognizes faithful donors who give consecutively for three or more years.

The Whitworth Foundation was established in 1972 with the purpose of helping individuals set up deferred gifts, such as charitable trusts and gift annuities. These arrangements provide tax savings and lifetime income to donors while they ultimately grow the university's endowment.
